Students entering grade 4 are usually ready to do some independent reading. Even though they can read on their own, it's still fine to read books aloud or together as you complete the squares on the bingo board.

No need to initial each square—just sign at the end of the summer to indicate that your child read all of the books that he or she has filled into the board. Children will bring their boards to school in September, so watch for news about bingo recognitions from your school!

As you help your child select books to read this summer, please consider this list a starting point. These titles are suggestions from teachers across town and the librarians at Thayer Library. None of these are required reads, and students are welcome to read from the grade levels above or below their own! We hope you find this list helpful as you look for new great reads and perhaps revisit some old favorites.
